A successful raid was carried out by the 16th. Canadian Infantry Battalion (Canadian Scottish ) during the early hours of Wednesday February 13th 1918, on the enemy trenches at BOIS HUGO on the LEMS front, Six prisoners were taken, from which the adentity of the 190th and 55tg. German Regiments was established. In addition heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy. The Battalion, on their part, had one man die of wounds, and six wounded.

The raiding party consisted of five sections - one of 12 other ranks and a Lewis Gun, under Lieut. B.W. Allen, with L/Cpl. W.A. Eddy in charge of the gun and crew. The other four sections consisted of six Other Ranks each, in charge of Cpl. Kines, L/Cpl. Currie. L/Cpl. Rankin and Sergt. Barrett Respectively. Captain S.D. Johnston was in command of the whole.

On the day before the raid Captain Johnston, with Lieut. A.J. Thomson, recommoitred the position, going out into No Man's Land in biboad daylight at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. On the left, opposite BOIS HUGO, the wire was found to be in poor condition and a perfect gap was discovered, evidently used by enemy patrols and listening posts; while an old trench from our front line led to within 20 yards of this point, making an excellent jumping off place and, and affording good cover to a party getting out and using it as such. On the right, the Wood continued across NO Man's Land into the German lines, and working their way along on their stomachs the two Officers were able to crawl up to a point within his first line of wire, which was in scattered clumps, to within 20 yards of his front line. Here progress was stopped by an old trench filled with wire entanglements, and between that and his front line were three lines of wire. Here again a lane through the wire was observed; it was about teh feet wide and an ideal place to make an entry into Them Hun lines, the only obstacle being the wire filled trench.

The plan of attack finally adopted was that Captain Johnston's party would attack on the right of the wood, while Lieut. Allen's party, proceeding up the old trench on the left of the wood across No Man's Land, would enter a point directly opposite through the lane in the wire, where they would protect the flank and collect any

prisoners that might be driven that way.

Lieut. Allen's party procesing up the sap, reached their jumping off place at 2.45 a.m. At 5.06 a.m. he sounded a captured . German Gas Alarm and at the same time jumped, reaching the enemy line where they met with little opposition and quickly took up their position on the enemy parapet.

At this time, on the right, a party of the enemy commended to bomb them and wounded two of the party. This opposition was quickly dispersed and pns dugout in the trench was bombed.

On the right, with Capt. Johnston's party, considerable difficulty and delay were experienced in getting to the jumping off position. This was due to the size of the party, the amount of material carried and the difficult nature of the ground to go over. Getting through the wood made considerable, but unavoidable, noise, and the enemy machine guns swept the mround constantly. Our guide was a tape from our front line trench to the jumping off position, which Lieut. Thomson, who had reconnoitred the position by daylight, had started out to lay at midnight, with a patrol of three men. At five minutes to the Zero hour the head of the party arrived at the tape end where Lieut. Thomson was. He had been unable to find the point in front of the gap owing to the shortness of time, Bnemy movement on the left and machine gun fire from the enemy trenches. Consequently, Captain Johnston's party found itself in the wrong place, though on this side of the wire filled trenon - probably rather to the right of where they ought to have been.

It was a critical moment, for where they had expected a clear path to their objective over ground they knew they found themselves in a strange phace and in front of them a considerable depth of wire. For a moment it looked as if the raid would have to be called off, but just them the barrage fell on the Hun frony line. There was little time to act, and knowing Lieut. Allen's party would get cleanly away, the decision was quickly made to jump from where they were. It was even more confusing now as the barrage line fell in rear of the party on their right. Before the barrage lifted two sections were rushed up over the wire filled trench on bath mate brought for the purpose, and the other lines of wire were rushed. A bath mat was used to cross the first line of wire, the second was out and trampled down and the third

line was walked over. The machine guns in the enemy trenches were very active until the barrage dropped. As the barrage lifted to ... the enmy support line the guns again opened up. A volley of rifle gremades was fired followed by the rush of the two leading sections. while the two rear sections kept up a barrage of grenades, which appeared to be effective, Captain Johnston and Lieut Thomson (who was present without orders) rushed for the Hun's front trench and jumped in together followed immediately by the two leading sections, and in rear of them came the two rear sections with mobile charges, etc. The German C.T. at this point was found to have been blocked by our barrage and the party divided in two, proceeding to the right and left, bombing as they went. Captain Johnston received a bullet through the arm from the mouth of a dugout but immediately shot the man with his revolver. Three xxee ax Sarmane xxee axe seems smoke bombs were thrown down, followed by Mills Grenades. Three dead Germans were seen on the steps of the dugout, which was finally destroyed by a mobile charge of ammonal. Seven dugouts were treated in a similar manner, and it is estimated that from 35 to 50 Germans were killed. A machine gun was also taken and brought out. Three prisoners were captured by each of the two parties, one batch belonging to the 190th Regiment and the other to the 55th. Regiment, from which it was evident that the raid had been aimed as a point where two Divisional fronts joined. One prisoner, taken by Capt. Johnston, laid down his rigle, threw off his equipment and put up his hands with such clock-like precision that Captain Johnston thought at first that he was going through some form of military exercise, and was awaiting with interest the next movement when one of the memoof the raiding party rushed up, and in a frenzy of enthusiasm, knocked his apectacles off, and commenced to pummel him severely before Capt. Johnston could interfere.

On the left, two Germans - evidently the remains of a machinegun crew - had established themselves on the parados and sniped at the raiders as they approached, severely wounding Pte. Arason and, less seriqualy, several others. Thetywere mombed and killed and their machine-gun found in the trench Connection was made with Lieut. Allen's party, and Captain Lyons appeared about this time walking along the Hun front line with the aid of a flash light. The signal for return and gone up some fifteen minutes before, but as there was no sign of the reiders' return he had come along to tell them to get away while they had the chance. Capt. Johnston, therefore, collected his men and the whole party withdrew gwerland, guided by a tape laid by one Lieut. Allen's men. Everybody was clear of the German trench by 3.45 a.m.

The night was dark and there was rain during the operation.

The maxix enemy trench was found to be in fairly good condition,
but contained no bath mats, and had been seriously damaged by our
barrage, which had given very effective support. We shrapnel was
used; it was entirely a H.W. Barrage, but up by the eighteen-poundera

The conduct of the sen throughout was splended, and the section-leaders showed great initiative and dash in leading their mem through the wire, down the enemy line and in successfully getting them men back to our own line again.

Particularly notewerthy was the conduct of Pte. F.E. Madley and Pte. O. Berquist who - with Lieut. Thomson - volunteered to carry out Pte. Arason, who was mortally wounded. Pte. Arason weighed over 200 lbs. but they carried him back to our front line - a distance of over 300 yards - over rough, shell out mands woods and lines of wire and old treaches. Later, these two sendid gallant work in bombing up the trenches and bringing up mobile charges to blow up dugouts.

L/Opl. Rankin and Pte. Milley were recommended for their gallantry and devotion to duty in bombing down the enemy trenches.

When opposition was met on the left at the very last these two mmen attacked and killed the Germans who were in position on the parados, and whose machine gun in the trench was captured.

The raiders had comoughaged themselves for the occasion in old Imperial tunios, specially drawn from Ordmanos, representing a variety of unlikely regiments. Captain Johnston himself wore Australian uniform.

Simultaneously with this raid, another party of the 16th.

Battalion, under Captain Scroggie, raided the enemy trenches further to
the right, but were unable to penetrate the enmy wire and withdrew.

Lieut. E.R.E. Allen was severely wounded through the back while
endeavouring to out the wire; and several other casualties were incurred.



Summary of Events and Information Place Date Hour Narrative of raids, made by 16th. Cdn. Inf. Bn. "CANADIAN SCOTTISH." on night of April 27/28th Map Reference 1918. Trench Map 51 B. N.W. RAID "B". The first objective was the new enemy outpost line from H.5.d.60.60 to H.5.b.60.15. The second objective was their front line between H. 6. c. 2. 6. and H. 6.a. 4.1. Recommaissances were carried out on the three nights previous to the raid by all officers conserned. Many N. C.O's were also taken to the assembly position, 30% of the party were shown the objectives in daylight. Every section commander was previously given a sketch map, and the fullest information possible was given to all ranks. Everything taxt was done in the way of preparation that could be done in the short space of time allowed before the said took place. No. 2 Company being detailed for the raid, volunteers were called for. 75% of the company responded and the remainder were perfectly willing to go. The original intention was to attack the enemy's front and support lines, but on the night of the 25th., Captain Soroggie and Lieut, McLennan discovered the enemy digging a new outpost lige. On the night previous to the raid, the enmy was suffered to continue his digging, but steps were taken to prevent him from putting up any further wire in front of his new line. The party left out front line at 10,00 p.m. April 27th. Prior to this Lieut. MacLennan ran a marking tape 150 yards in length to the right flank of the assembly position, within 100 yards of the first objective. This proved of great value. The night was very dark which made it somewhat difficult to assemble the party, but by compass readings the formation was completed by midnight. The darkness was then in our favour and the party crawled forward from shell hole to shell hole until they reached a line about 60 yards from the German wire, by 12,40 a.m. At the wame time Ligute. Reid and Hill took parties of 6 O.R's on the right and left flanks respective ly crawling up to within 15 yards. The enemy, having evidently observed some movement, sent up some Very Lights and begam firing with rifles and machine guns at 12.50 a.m. At 1,00 a.m. our field gun barrage opened up somewhat raggedly on the enemy's front line. The only resistance offered here was by two light machine guns, one on each flank, and by a few snipers. Cpl. Langtry rushed the left gun and bayonetted the crew; a bomb settled the fate of the right gun. About half a dozen prisoners, probably part of a working party were taken here. Some fifteen were killed, and some dugoute in an old line of gunpits were bombed. Captain Soroggie M.C. remained here with two runners, Two Lewis Guns were established on either flank. On the left, Sgt. Leslie, M.M. established a block and bombed the enemy outposts beyond, inflicting casualties. The right flank was protected by the 14th Battalion raiders By 1.05 a.m. two platoons under Lieuts. Tuxford and Gibson had leap-frogged the two platoons in possession of the outpost line and advanced at the double to the enemy front line. by 1.20 a.m. our barrage which had badly smashed this trench, lifted further and the party immediately climbed over a 15 foot embankment in front of the trench and fell to. Here again the only resistance offered was by a few snipers and by two machine guns which we were almost immediately silenced by bombs, one being destroyed and the other captured by L/Cpl. Parnett. Numerous dugouts were found in this line, 5 of which were completely destroyed by H.E. One of them convained at least twelve men, who refused to come out and who were disposed of by means of two ammonal tubes thrown down the entrances. Lieuts. McLennan, Tuxford and Gibson enetered several dugouts and made prisoners, one Company Commander and about 20 Other Ranks, Ligut, McLennan brought back an Amplifier Set and many valuable maps, and documents were also obtained. Telephone wires were cut and as much damage as possible done to the trench. At 1.40 a.m. red lights as previously arranged were sent up from our front line as a warning to withdraw. The party began to return five minutes later, bringing all wounded with them. After all had passed through the outpost line the two platoons there, withdrew also. The rapidity with which operations were carried out is believed to have been the reason that no enemy 8.0.8. was sent up. Their artillery retaliation was light and our counter battery The conduct of all ranks was most praisworthy, the entire operation being carried out with dash and precision. ### RAID "C".

The objective was the enemy outpost which had previously been located at 8.29.d.90.15. When the party rushed the outpost at 1.00 a.m. they met with no opposition, so reorganized and pushed on beyond the objective into the enemy's front line which was unfortunately deserted. On withdrawal the party was somewhat harassed by the enemy's fire. which; Pte. V. Rogers, one of the last men to return, encountered three of the enemy and brought them in single-manded. This party had bad luck as enemy had apparently deserted post. Lieuts. Cameron and

Molvor were unfortunately wounded by shell fare early in operation.

#### RAID "D".

The objective of this party was the enemy outpost previously located at B.29.5.55.10. This outpost was rushed and captured at 1.00 a.m. sharp. Lieut. A.J. Thompson being in the lead. The only opposition was a short burst of machine gun fire, but this unfortunately killed Lieut. Thompson, besides wounding two O.R's. Sgt. Jones, next in lead, jumped into the post, capturing the gun, but the enemy was by this time in flight. The party, therefore, advanced beyond their objective to the enemy's front line and bombed two dugouts but found no one.



At 6.45 p.m. we moved to W.28 Central where we sent out scouts to reconnoitre front areas.

The Company moved from GACHICOURR at 7.30 p.m. on 25th. Inst. to reliev the 20th Battailon right Company in the front line. En route I received a message from Brigade to also relieve three ports of the 5th. Extraines Brigade on our right. The guides led us astray after we crossed the BUISSY SWITCH and it was nexessary for us to return to that trench and follow it until we arrived at Headquarters of the 20th. Battailon. The guides for the additional posts we had to relieve were not here as I had been advised and we then proceeded to the line and relieved "B" Company. They held the line from W.25.4.70.10 to W.56.4.00.00 with two Platoons and a third Platoon in W.20.c. Central, Our lings then extended from E.1.4.55.95 to W.56.4.60.00 slong the edge of PATILAND WOOD. We had not causalties during the relief although we came under brisk shelling three times and were bonded once. Sals of was completed at 11.50 p.m.

Patrols were pushed out and three additional posts established. The enemy was active with M.G. fire and minenwerfers during the might.

The following might am enemy M.O. post was located 150 years in front of our lines W.E.O..+7. We did not disturb it and were sheclutely quiet to protect the assembly and on consultation with the O.O. 14th. Battallon on his arrival we desided to have a platon to protect his left flank and discharge rifle grenades on the post at Zero. We saintained two other outports to color us and the relief was completed at 1.00 a.m. 27th inst and three Platon moved to dugoute affording cover and shelter at W.E.O. central. In remaining platon fired on the M.G. Post at Zero but it had evidently withdrawn before then as it did not fire on the 14th. Battalion and no trace could be found of it. The Platon then joined the Company. Casualties 1 O.R. killed and 1 O.R. wanded.

At 2.00 p.m. 37th. we were ordered to report to 0.0. 15th. Battalion in the line as rainforcements. The company moved timediately to MARQUION and remained as \*.10.0 while I went forward at 1.0.0. 15th. pattalion 100 perds north of the village. He did not require assistance and we returned to \*.20.0 central. Gaussities 2 0.RIs wounded.

At 6.45 p.m. we moved to trenches at W.28 Central.
